Henry Mancini was an extremely talented musician but his real talent lay in writing, creating and arranging melodies within melodies and doing it in every type of music known. He wrote music for sci-fi (*Creature from the Black Lagoon*), mysteries (*A Touch of Evil*), adventure (*The Great Waldo Pepper*) and a movie by Orson Welles.



Easy listening music was a staple for him in the 1960s and 70s as was scoring for television shows. The range of music and the artists who recorded it is wide-ranging.

Johnny Mathis, The Lennon Sisters, Herb Alpert, Percy Faith and the Boston Pops, all from different sounds and styles of music, are just a few who made his music enjoyable for the rest of us.

Books on the Bosque Writing Contest

BAC member Beth Hatcher placed 2nd in last year's essay category with a piece about her experience as an administrator of a preschool ages 12 weeks to 6 years. After the school and parents had struggled unsuccessfully to find a way to calm a troubled five-year-old's outbursts, Beth tells how she stumbled upon a solution that she says was "part serendipity and part inspiration and part accident." Here are excerpts of Beth's award-winning essay:

Where did I find this mind-boggling, innovative strategy? It was hidden within a warm basket of laundry.

...Danny was once again in meltdown mode...I just took his hand and told him I needed his help. "Danny, we have a job to do. There are lots of washcloths that have to be folded for the infant rooms, and many more to wash and dry." We headed for the always-busy laundry room...With basket in hand, we unloaded the dryer and headed for my office...and started to fold. Somehow the warm cloths and the ordinary task connected with Danny. We began to fold and straighten and stack, and his little body calmed down. His screams became a memory...

Soon, our laundry folding was a daily thing. The teachers began to sense Danny's rising tensions and would call me before emotions engaged. Danny began to ask for his laundry break, recognizing the warning signals within himself. We spent a lot of time folding laundry that fall. We talked about how the babies needed his work. He delivered washcloths, towels, and burp rags into the classrooms and was always gratefully thanked by the teachers. The staff conspired to make sure there was always laundry that needed folding, even placing clean laundry in the dryer ready for Danny to do his thing...We didn't worry that Danny was not reciting his ABC's or practicing counting to 20. Danny had plenty of years for these academic pursuits. That fall, Danny was learning much more valuable things like selfcontrol, patience, and the healing value of work. He was practicing a five-year old version of an old, old truth: helping others can really be helping ourselves.

The list of elected officers and trustees is very similar to




last years' because officials agreed to serve another year.


Summer Camps

Clifton graduate C.E. "Pat" Olsen distinguished himself as a standout pitcher at Texas A&M, so much so the New York

Yankees traded for him after his graduation. (Olsen even roomed with the legendary Lou Gehrig in spring training.) Olsen only spent a few years in the minor leagues of baseball (one source reports he went 16-10 with a 1.25 ERA in 1924). He soon joined the business world and founded Gearench Manufacturing Company in Houston in 1927.



But he continued to follow his passion with his attendance and financial support. He was asked to throw out the ceremonial first pitch in the first game of the 1984 World Series; his talent and benevolence is reflected in A&M's baseball field being named after him.

Olsen also donated to the Major League pension fund.

Olsen had purchased the former Clifton College administration building to house a Clifton branch of Gearench. After selling the company, the philanthropist donated the facility with the added metal machine shop building to a new orga-
