40TH ANNUAL BOSQUE ART CLASSIC





Get your tickets soon for the 12th Annual Texas Troubadour Songwriter Classic on October 25 with Texas-born Lee Roy Parnell, who will bring his band to headline a concert after making his pick for this year's Troubadour winner. The singer, songwriter, and guitarist extraordinaire grew up in Stephenville, TX, before making his way to Austin and then Nashville. His breakthrough album came in 1992, with top-10 hits: "What Kind of Fool Do You Think I Am," "Love Without Mercy," and "Tender Moment." Fiber artist extraordinaire Tia Oliver led our September meeting with a hands-on session on using natural fibers and dyes to create one-of-a-kind patterns. Tia shared her extensive knowledge of plant-based dyes and led the group in creating hand-dyed (indigo!) fabrics. Each participant left with his/her unique fabric square and a great appreciation for Tia's skills and knowledge.

At October's meeting members will bring their "favorite things" to share with the Club-- a favorite type of brush, pencil, palette, brand of paint, a technique or artist's trick or shortcut you have in preparing your paint surface, enhancing your graphic art, adding to your journal or sketchbook or trying a new way of creating a collage... You get the idea: Anything goes as we share things from the many different areas of art that our group explores. For example, President Jan Beavers will bring her "wet palette" technique that she learned from a recent workshop. Let's try something new or share a "tried and true" method that others may not have discovered.
