

Through generous donations, five fullyequipped Yamaha 88-key pianos, including headphones, adjustable stands, benches and pedals, have been funded, purchased, and safely stored at BAC. Piano lessons for all ages, children to senior citizens, will hopefully begin in January 2021 as COVID-19 restrictions allow. Four piano instructors have volunteered to teach, and cost per session is hoped to be in the \$10 range. "Steve loved music and was a student himself until the very end of his life," said BCMA President Donna Jarman. "We believe others enjoying music through the Piano Lab would make Steve very happy." -BD
